Message from Mayor and Councillors

It is a pleasure to present City of Ballarat's Advocacy Priority Projects Pipeline.

These projects will bring quality-oflife benefits for Ballarat residents and for people in our region who regularly use our city's community, educational, health, recreation and cultural facilities and services.

Ballarat is a community and service centre for 160,000 people in the Central Highlands Region and 300,000 people living in Western Victoria.

These projects will have a profound, and in some cases, generational impact, delivering economic, environmental and social benefits far beyond the boundaries of our LGA.

Revenue Sources

With limited capacity to raise revenue (rate capping), and with fees and charges controlled by legislation, Councils are increasingly dependent on grants funding, election commitments and budget allocations to fund major infrastructure projects.

These factors, coupled with inflation and increasing construction costs, limit Council's capacity to deliver key projects without funding from the Victorian and Australian Governments.

Successful Partnerships

In recent years Council has successfully partnered with the Victorian and Australian Governments to facilitate the delivery of essential infrastructure across the municipality.

Our local Members of Parliament have been strong advocates for these projects - their support has been invaluable. Thank you on behalf of the people of Ballarat.

Council will continue to work with both levels of government to secure funding to deliver City of Ballarat's Advocacy Priority Projects Pipeline.
